

Child Malnutrition Rising Alarmingly

The number of malnourished children will hit nine million by the end of the year, according to a new report.

Officials of the Institute of Public Health and Nutrition (IPHN) and Save the Children, at a seminar in Dhaka on Monday, asked the government to include large number of community health workers to prevent the situation from becoming a disaster.

Cleland Stevenson, resident representative of Save the Children in Bangladesh, delivered welcome notes in the seminar.

The effectiveness of Ready to Use Therapeutic Foods (RUTF), a mixture of nuts, milk and micronutrient, was discussed in the seminar.

IPHN director Fatima Parveen Chowdhury said extreme malnutrition crisis developed in the country, although several programmes were taken in the past 20 years to tackle the situation.

"We have conducted a research on malnutrition at Borhanuddin and Lalmohon Upazila under Bholá from June 2009 to June 2010," she said, adding, "RUTF was supplied to the children of the area during the research."

She also said one year research was not enough in this regard.

Chief researcher of Taft University Kate Sedley said the goal of the research was to find the process of preventing malnutrition of children.

"The community health workers found and treated 724 children affected by malnutrition at Borhanuddin," she said.

"But the attempts at Lalmohon in this regard was unsuccessful," she added.
